Legacies of Power: How Male Entitlement, Misogyny, and History Fuel Sex Trafficking—And How We Stop It (Bell)

This discussion will highlight findings from Rights4Girls' new report, Buyers Unmasked: Exposing the Men Who Buy Sex and Solutions to End Exploitation, using buyers' own words to show how predominantly male purchasers view those they solicit for sex. It also traces U.S. sex trade roots to colonization and slavery, links incel culture and male entitlement, and outlines promising deterrence and trafficking prevention strategies.
